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LESSONS LEARNED FROM JUDGING

On October 15, 2010 my Bulbophyllum Doris Dukes 'Cecilia Bofill' was awarded an 83-point Certificate of Cultural Merit (CCM) by the AOS. The award was given by the Florida-Caribbean Judging Center at the Fairchild Tropical Garden in Miami. I purchased this plant at the Delray Beach Orchid Society Show on October 30, 2004. Coincidentally the plant was awarded six years, almost to the day, from the date I bought it.

On October 28, 2006 (this plant is definitely an October bloomer) I took the plant for judging to the Palm Beach Judging Center, at the AOS headquarters in Delray Beach. Although at that time it was "Nominated" for judging, it was later "Passed" for final judging. Two lessons were learned from this experience: Lesson #1 – although a plant may be nominated for judging it doesn't guarantee that it will be judged. Sounds confusing?? During the judging process several plants are pre-selected (nominated) for judging from among all the plants brought to be judged on that day. The nominated plants are then



assigned to the various Judging Teams, who are responsible to determine if they have the attributes necessary for further evaluation. If a plant is passed it is eliminated from further consideration. The fact that a plant is selected for further evaluation does not guarantee that it will receive an AOS award. Lesson #2 – If you take a plant to be judged leave it at the judging center and pick it up after judging is finished. You are always welcome to stay and observe the proceedings but, if you do, stay in the background. AOS judging is an anonymous process and you must avoid prejudicing your plant. The first time my plant was judged I was invited to seat at one of the judging tables. This was an exciting and unique opportunity for someone that was not an AOS judge or a trainee. By a quirk of fate my plant was transferred from another table to the one I was in. Although I know for a fact that the condition of my plant at the time did not deserve an award, I am convinced that my presence at the judges table did not help necessarily.

The flowers of Bulbophyllum Doris Dukes 'Cecilia Bofill', like those of most bulbophyllums, last for a week to ten days depending on ambient temperature at the time. Concerned about the condition of the flowers, I waited until the day judging was to take place to prepare the plant. On top of this, having to travel that same morning to Miami for judging limited the time available to prep the plant. Had I given the plant proper preparation, the number of points awarded would have been greater, since the plant had 50% more flowers than previously awarded Doris Dukes. Lesson #3 – proper preparation of plants to be taken for judging can make a difference in the quality of award received, and in the number of points awarded to your plant.

The experienced of receiving an AOS award, regardless of category or points, is an exhilarating experience. Even though it was the second one, this award was as rewarding as the one I received earlier this year for Bulbophyllum ambrosia 'Tonky B'. Lessons #4 – If you have a nice plant with lots of flowers don't be afraid to take it in for AOS judging. Even if your plant is not awarded the experience will be worth the effort.



CULTIVATION



Growing Tips for September Dr. Courtney Hackney, hackneau@comcast.net Dept. Biology, Univ. North Florida

Whether you grow on a window sill, under lights or in a greenhouse, the start of fall brings the realization that

cold weather is around the corner. Will all of those fantastic acquisitions you got last spring and summer fit into your growing space once cold weather arrives?

Like it or not, this is the time to evaluate your orchid collection and decide if there are some orchids that are not living up to your expectations. That does not always mean that they are poor orchids. Every hobbyist has growing conditions and culture habits that favor some orchids, but not others. If you have an orchid that does not grow for you, consider it a space-making candidate. If it is a clone or a plant that has nice flowers, find a good home for it. It is not hard to find a new hobbyist that will be excited to get it. Often, the same orchid that would not grow for you will thrive for someone else.



Purge unhealthy plants from your collection

There are also some orchids that are prone to disease and are destined to eventually die, no matter what you do. Save yourself years of grief and toss it. When you do, you will join the company of many an accomplished orchid grower who fill garbage cans with orchids that did not live up to expectations. Some of these throw-away orchids are genetically inferior, while others had the bad fortune of contracting a disease at some time in their life and could just not grow out of it.



Orchids with genetic inferiorities should be trashed

My own collection is definitely filling every inch of growing space. Many seedlings moved up into larger pots this year. Some of my favorite clones were divided this summer and I always keep an extra piece of my favorites. Eventually, these will find a good home, but it is always a good idea to hold on to a division of your favorites for a year or two after the plant is divided just in case one division does not thrive after repotting.

The hardest orchids to part with are those that grow extremely well, but just do not produce high quality flowers. An orchid that grows well and flowers every year is a keeper. When all of your orchids grow like weeds, consider keeping those orchids that both grow well and produce high quality flowers.

Be sure that your definition of a good bloom is not being influenced by judging standards. If you like an orchid or enjoy its fragrance regardless of its status in the judging arena, keep it.


One of the great aspects of local orchid clubs is that one can see all kinds of orchid species and hybrids. It is the great diversity found among orchids that keep orchid hobbyists' attention year after year. It is not necessary, however, to possess all of them, which is easier said than done. If you find something you really like, discuss its culture with the owner and decide if this is something that you can grow under your conditions.

Most clubs have nice libraries with books on just about every type of orchid and hybrid. Find out everything you can about an orchid that piques your interest. If you take some time before you buy that unusual orchid, there will not be as many orchids to discard in future years. Nothing is more discouraging than having a window sill full of orchids that will just not grow and flower under your conditions.

- 3. Your orchid must have a name.
- 4. It must be in the correct category. (Ask if you don't know.)
- 5. PLEASE PRINT CLEARLY the name of the Orchid and your name on the Registration Form.
- 6. Try to place your plant in an attractive container to enhance the orchids beauty.

PLANTS NOT MEETING THESE CRITERIA MAY BE DISQUALIFIED FROM JUDGING.




REFRESHMENTS


